HUMAN SERVICES (A.S.) +

The Human Services program prepares you for entry into the helping professions. You will gain the foundational knowledge and skills needed to work in mental health centers, home health and respite organizations, substance abuse programs, family crisis centers, community development agencies, and other human service programs. Many participants in this program choose to continue their education at the baccalaureate level and beyond.

All associate degrees include completion of general education requirements which, together with program requirements, constitute a minimum of 60 credits. In some cases program requirements also fulfill general education requirements. You may not use a single course to meet two general education requirements.

- Students may complete this program and transfer into a bachelor's degree program in Social Work or Human Services.
- Many students choose to complete the Substance Abuse Services certificate in conjunction with the Human Services degree to broaden their skill set and employment options.
- The required field experience (Community & Work Experience) gives students practical experience in the workplace and can be a stepping-stone to employment and/or provide students with a valuable employment reference.
